

What is the Social Action Plan?

The City of Surrey's Social Action Plan envisions a City where all people have equitable opportunities to thrive. The Plan will identify key social priorities impacting Surrey residents and the community, and actions to address these priorities.

The Social Action Plan will guide the work of the Community Services Department's Housing and Social Development Division. The Housing and Social Development team will develop the plan through research and community engagement with a focus on equity deserving groups.

Why the City of Surrey Needs this Plan

- To address and improve the social conditions impacting residents and community in the City of Surrey
- Replace the current 2006
 Social Plan
- Identify current social priorities for the City of Surrey
- Clarify the role of the City (and other partners) with respect to addressing social issues
- Identify strategies and actions for the Housing and Social Development Division to implement over the next 5 years
