

BORROWING A STORYWALK® KIT

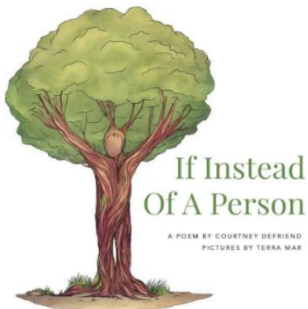
We have StoryWalk® kits available for use by local organizations, schools, and community groups.

StoryWalk® kits combine literacy, exercise, nature, and family bonding. This is an innovative and delightful way for children — and adults! — to enjoy reading and the outdoors at the same time. Pages from a book are mounted on boards, which can be installed along an outdoor path. As you stroll down the trail, you're directed to the next page in the story.

The kits are suitable to be placed outdoors rain or shine as all pages are laminated, placed onto plastic boards and stuck into the ground with metal stakes. We encourage you to use the kits creatively. They can even be used indoors.

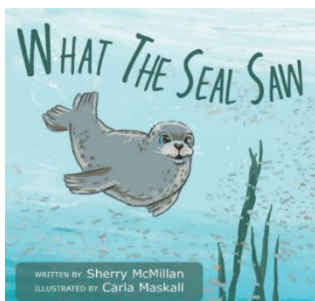
Each self-contained kit includes laminated pages, plastic boards, stakes and ties, and an activity guide all packed in a plastic tote. The kit is free to borrow

Reserving a kit is simple, just let us know which one, when you would like it, for how long, and where you need it. Depending on location, we can arrange to have it dropped off, have you pick it up, or meet somewhere in the middle. Kits can be borrowed for up to 30 days, email reservation are preferred, provided the kit hasn't already been requested. The only thing we ask is that it gets taken down at the end of the day, wiped down if needed, and stored safely to prevent vandalism.



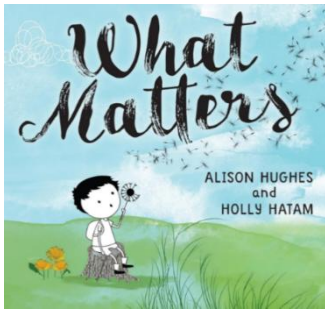
If Instead of a Person (by local author, Courtney Defriend)

“Explores ancient Indigenous teachings about the role that our environment and nature play in teaching us about how to be human.”



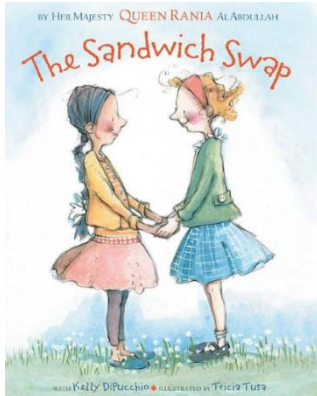
What The Seal Saw (by local author, Sherry McMillan)

“A charming book about what a seal saw on his journey through the waters. A fun experience for a child to see the world through the eyes of an animal.”



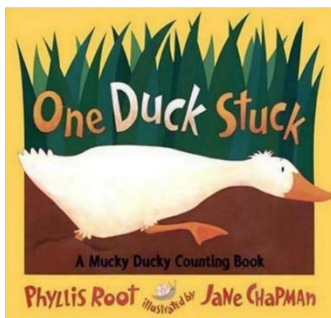
What Matters (by Alison Hughes)

“Sensitively explores nature's connections and traces the ripple effects of one child's good deed to show how we can all make a big difference.”



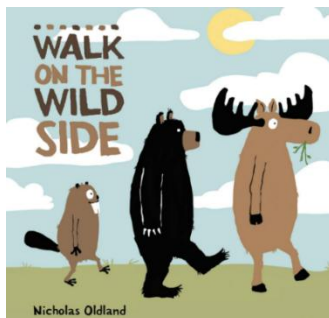
The Sandwich Swap (by Kelly DiPucchio & Queen Rania of Jordan)
